While attending Frontier Regional High School in the mid-1960s, I worked three summers for Zagrodnik's Tobacco Company. Several of we girls from South Deerfield (myself, Nancy (Szymanski) Shyloski, Sandy Lacey, Sandra Mitchkoski, and Liz Johnson) gathered at the corner of Graves Street around 5 am daily (including Saturdays) to catch the exhaust-filled bus to the field for the day. had a wonderful and very pleasant driver. While waiting for the bus, we often went to Bill's Drugstore across the way to purchase Fudgsicles (best ones ever) to complete our breakfast.

Although it was excruciatingly hot (seemingly well over 100 degrees) while working under the tents as we made our way down the long rows tying the tobacco, we had a fun time socializing while enjoying each other's company. Luckily, there was a water barrel waiting for us at the end of the rows. Oh yes, once during the Summer Mr. Zagrodnik would treat us with a soda of choice.


After all the tobacco was tied, picked and the leaves sent to the barn in huge canvas baskets (sometimes filled with frogs, snakes and other unpleasant wiggly creatures at the courtesy of the boys in the field), it was time to sew the leaves, after which they were hung on the poles to cure.

We worked as a team (two sewers at each sewing machine) and, not to brag, we were the fastest sewers making \$1.00 a bundle consisting of 50 lath. Incidentally, we made 60 cents an hour while tying the tobacco.

Mr. Zagrodnick graciously provided a wonderful and generous end-of-season party at the Hatfield Barn with delicious food and music.

The year after I left to go to college, a watch was provided to the fastest sewer -- just my luck.
